

In case of emergency, ring 000



The Fire Danger Period Ended At Midnight April 30th.

Before Burning Off Check Cardinia Council By-Laws

Before lighting a burn off:

- Check Council By Laws for restrictions on burning in certain areas, or if a permit is required.
- Check the weather forecast for expected wind speed
- Inform your neighbours.
- Register your burn with E.S.T.A on 1800 668 511
- Have fire fighting equipment on hand.
- Clear around your pile.

As the weather gets cooler heaters will start to be used and electric blankets will be taken out of storage, So before using solid fuel heaters ensure that the flue or chimney is clean and in good repair, and that gas heaters have been serviced and electric heaters checked for damage before use. Electric blankets should also be carefully inspected before use and if in doubt do not use it.



The brigade continues to very busy with an average of three calls a week and training that is non-stop,

"You don't know how much you miss something until it's gone"

That was the case recently when the Tynong Progress Association and the Tynong Fire Brigade were to order their wreaths for the ANZAC Day service. For many years, we bought them from the fabulous ladies at Pakenham florist. Sadly, due to the inability to find new premises, the florist shop had to close. Thank you Alli and Lorraine and all the people who worked for you over the last however many years – you looked after us so well, we will miss you all.

Scammer says Sorry | Roman Kulkewycz

Scrolling through my Facebook account recently my eye caught sight of a notice inserted by a multi millionaire woman who had won 552million dollars in a lottery and was generously giving a large portion of it away. All I had to do was apply and Bingo the money would be on its way!

It was glaringly obvious that this was a very basic amateurish scam that should not fool anyone. So I decided to play along with her game. A golden rule is to never reveal any information about oneself or one's account. She asked me for my address and phone number which I just made up to keep the game going. After some time she told me my parcel containing \$665,000 would be delivered to me that afternoon. I replied with overflowing joy and gratitude. However for me to receive this parcel of money I had to pay a Courier delivery expenses of \$300.

Next I was instructed to go to the Post Office and buy \$300 in Gift Cards to pay this delivery charge. I said I would be back home in 20 minutes with the Gift cards as I lived close to the Post Office.

I had a cup of tea and watched the clock for half an hour to pass by then I messaged her again saying I was back. I was told to peel back a backing paper which would reveal a set of 16 numbers. I had to take a photo of these digits and send to her. I said that I didn't have a camera, nor a mobile phone. I didn't have any Gift cards either. I also asked her why there was so much hassle if she was sending me \$665,000 and here we were arguing over a miserly \$300. That was it, she had no answer to this question.

After giving her the imaginary "numbers" incorrectly several times, she became frustrated and there was anger in her voice. Then I said to her that if we were playing chess I had her checkmate ages ago. I told her the game was up! I asked her how good did she feel scamming people out of their money and did she sleep well at night? I kept humiliating her and she eventually caved in and said she was sorry. I asked her a series of questions and she reluctantly answered a couple only. She told me that she lived in Nigeria and she was 21 years old. She did not work for a syndicate or boss, but from home using a laptop computer. She claimed to have come from a broken home and to survive she had to resort to scamming. She claimed she never scammed people's bank accounts, because this would be against her principles. Some months she would not make any money and her most profitable victims were in USA due to the high value of the US Dollar. Canada was another fertile scamming country.

As I asked her more questions she became uneasy and standoffish and eventually stopped replying to me altogether.

However her parting words to me were that should I encounter something that I might suspect be a scam, to let her know the details and she would advise me whether it was a scam or not. Go figure!

THE TYNONG HALL HISTORY | Gladys Quigley and Denise Davidson



The Tynong Hall was built in 1928 (I believe). The original hall was built in 1887 as it was in receipt of government grants in the years 1887, 1888 and 1889.

At this stage there was no kitchen attached to the hall. The first state school building was moved from Tynong Road where St Thomas Aquinas school is now, to a position behind the hall. It was a three roomed building and the smaller room was the kitchen, which also had an open fireplace. A small room off the main room was used as a Baby Health Centre until the new building was built next door, which is where it still is today. There were toilets (thunder boxes) situated near the building. The third room was the supper room.

The hall was used for badminton, dances, concerts, the picture theatre, talent quests, State School, Christmas parties, meetings, CWA kitchen teas and parties. During the early 1950s the hall committee held very successful fortnightly dances and euchre nights, Sunday School and Church of England meetings. One highlight of this time was a Debutante Ball (I have a photo of the ball), the only one ever held in the hall. Like the fortnightly dances, there was standing room only.

A substantial amount of money was raised, enough in fact, to build a new kitchen attached to the main hall. The old supper room was removed from behind the hall (but not the toilets) and was eventually located to the Old Gipps Town at Moe, where it still is today.

During the 1950s, there was a cinema and external steps up to the projector room was situated on the outside of the hall near the double front doors. Inside the foyer was a ticket box which had a selling window to purchase tickets.

A badminton court was painted in the early 1950s with A, B and C grade competition playing in West Gippsland Badminton Association. Many a happy and long night was spent around the open fire in the supper room after the games were over.

In 1959, during a very windy August night, the hall was "blown off its foundations".

By 1961 it was reblocked and had big supports built on each side of the hall so that it would not occur again. Late in 1961 it was once again open for public use.

Another amazing event took place in 1965 when there was a "Back to Tynong" celebration held in the hall. It was a very popular event with a large committee of locals helping to organize the entertainment and sit down, two-course meal. The committee held dances on the first Saturday of every month as well as Cup Eve Ball, prior to Cup Day. These were very successful and gave the Hall Committee funds that could be put into the maintenance and taking care of the hall.

The toilet block was built in 1981 and the whole hall ceiling was replaced in 1982. Gas heaters and lighting were installed in 1994 to both the hall and supper room. Heaters in the mail hall still operate today.

In 1998, the hall was reblocked again and the external walls replaced. The stays that were put up in 1961 after the hall blew over, were removed. This work was completed by the committee, with the assistance of Corrective Services of Victoria. Each weekend a team of workers with a supervisor would arrive by bus and complete community hours as per their court instructions. The committee would provide lunch with a BBQ. The replacement of the walls took several months, and these boards are the ones still on the hall today.

The extension of the toilet block was added to the main hall in the 1990s as well as the concreting of the car park, replacing the sand car park which required maintenance.

The Hall Committee was still very active with the monthly dances and continued to raise money, putting funds back into the hall.

In the 2000s a mural, depicting a scene at the original Tynong quarry, was painted on the stage wall. A new fridge and stove were purchased in 2005. The disabled toilet and ramp were built in 2006. The hall floors were sanded and polished in 2007, followed by planting the external garden and new fencing. 2009 saw the completion of the Honour Board. Sewerage was connected in 2010, followed by painting of the internal walls and replacement of bench tops in the kitchen in 2011. And in 2013, air conditioning was installed in the supper room.

This is a history as we remember, having been involved with the Hall Committee for many years.

'From boy to Veteran' | Terrence Reeves

In 2003, at the age of eighteen, I stood at the crossroads, unsure of my scene.

My Grandpa, an army man, held stories

Though he rarely spoke, those secrets I'd keep.

Before I knew it, I flew from Brisbane to Melbourne's embrace,

On a bus, I looked around, wondering, "Is this really my place?"

The air was thick with silence as night began

Arriving at HMAS Cerberus, my heart echoed a call

We had our haircuts, our uniforms new but not neat.

Showed our racks, and our first navy meal ready to eat.

Not based on looks, but by orders we marched.

What we did felt awkward; our arms flailed, unstarched.

But over time, that little squad grew strong, We became a family, where each of us belonged.

Amongst us were boatswains, tradesmen, and chefs.

Each day we dressed alike, united in our quests.

Excited yet scared, my first posting was to

Why the Navy? I'd barely been on a boat as a child, I was wild and free.

Yet there I stood at the gangway, blue duffle bag in hand,

Knees shaking with nerves, unsure of my stand.

I never forgot my first Navy family; now it was time to learn,

New guys have the top rack; there wasn't much room to turn.

Morning came, I jumped from my rack straight into a mob,

Forty-five sailors vying for three toilets—what a job!

As the months at sea passed, the horizons grew wide,

The bed may be small, but the adventure was my guide.

Sailors are known for tattoos, I now had many in places I could not hide,

My parents might've frowned, but they took it in their stride.

Then came ashore posting; good times filled seek space.

Yet something felt missing, a void I couldn't bear

My sea legs settled, and I laughed with mates over beers,

But soon a posting to war loomed, which pricked up my ears.

Now that I wasn't that nervous boy, I embraced what lay ahead,

After months of training, bad news came, heavy with dread.

Before we sailed, my captain called me, his voice sombre and low,

"Your Grandpa has died; you must return, go."

I made it back for the funeral, then flew straight back to the ship,

Off we sailed through the heads, got ammunition on our trip.

This was the longest deployment, facing the unknown,

Every sailor aboard stood ready, prepared, and grown.

Each night, the sky was a canvas of chaos lit with fire fiaht.

Unsettled, as danger lurked, always ready to

In a warzone we lived, our enemy bold and

With ammunition at the ready, we were prepared to let it fly.

The time came to depart, to return home at

Berthed beside a sea of family, a moment unsurpassed.

Everyone rushed off the ship; I saw my mum and dad.

Yet something held me back; a strange mix of joy and sad.

Six years had passed, the question arose, "Will you sign back on?"

I pondered deeply, reflecting on battles fought and won.

With the GFC in full swing, Dad urged, "Stay a little longer, son."

So do I jump on the next ship back to war or seek a patrol boat run?

Soon enough, I found myself in Darwin's sweltering heat,

Patrol boats felt different, a new challenge to greet.

With a crew so small, we bonded tight and

It wasn't all games and laughs; we had water borders to pursue.

Then I posted to Cairns, back to sea again, the life I chose to embrace, But beneath the surface, I had an urge to

The ten-year mark passed, with discharge papers in hand,

I ventured to work on an oil rig, the sea still my command.

So here lies the tale of this veteran today, I often get asked, "Would you choose this path again?" they say.

The answer is simple, the skills I learned, the places I've seen,

The mates I made, who still stand with me keen.

Deep down, I know I wouldn't be who I am today

Without the joy and the pain woven into my wav.

This is my story on days such as today, As we lay our wreaths in honour, with gratitude on display.
